Key facts and stats

The Gairloch youth team worked with over 60 youngsters aged between 11 and 21 amounting to 660 meaningful contacts

In total there were 2655 hours of engagement with young people

These were delivered on 35 separate occasions

Sessions took place in Gairloch High School, The Den Youth Club, summer activities and in the local environment

THE STORIES: THE DIFFERENCES: THE FUTURE

The Den Youth Club

The youth work team has now expanded and has a part time member of staff supporting the Den Youth club and has introduced new learning opportunities and experiences. The YDO brought young people from Kyle to the Den to participate in mixed team football and then an evening meal

Gairloch Youth Forum

The youth forum is still in its infancy and has had many barriers to cross but will see more members join over the coming year. School assemblies have been planned by current members in order to inform the school community about membership of a local youth forum and the Highland Youth Parliament.

Supporting young people in need

Four young people were identified by Gairloch High School, Gairloch and Poolewe Primary Head and lead practitioners as needing an extended transitional period in to High school, The four boys chose to join the group and competed there discovery John Muir award over a period of eight weeks, every Friday morning during curriculum time
