#### **Projects**

#### **Dornoch Youth Club**

DYC runs every Tuesday night from 7pm - 9pm with average attendance ranging from 15-20 each week. This winter the young people have enjoyed trips to the Infinity Trampoline Park and Breakout Games.

#### **Employability**

Tree of Knowledge training sessions took place in the winter months with 6 completing the skills for life and work training. They then delivered six activities to the younger group. The photo shows them at their award presentation.

#### **Developing Young Workforce.**

A careers event for Sutherland was organised in partnership with DYW, Chamber of Commerce, Dornoch Academy and local businesses. The young people also cooked and prepared the soup and buffet lunch for 120 people.

#### **Business Breakfast**

Over 80 young people met with 23 local businesses to discuss career opportunities and options for learning for life and work. This is now an annual event which provides opportunities for young people to look at local career choices.

#### **HI Fires Youth Training Course**

In Partnership with Highlands and Island Fire and Rescue Team 12 young people took part in the HI Fires youth training course. One of the main aims is to try and develop attitudes and perceptions of young people by showing them life skills and responsibilities. They took part in a basic work experience programme including first aid, use of operational equipment such as hose and ladder work and simulated fire incidents, all within a controlled environment.
