

What is the Highland Archive Service?

The Highland Archive Service (HAS) has four centres (in Inverness, Wick, Portree and Fort William) where we look after millions of historic documents relating to the Highlands



What sort of documents?

Everything from school and property records to letters, diaries and maps. Our documents date from the 1200s through to the present day. They're full of true stories of people and places.



How can schools use archives?

 Archives tell the story of Highlanders and Islanders over centuries and can be linked into all study areas in the Curriculum for Excellence.



- Archives from your local area can help bring a subject to life for pupils.
- Using archive material for research, or as inspiration for artwork/writing, can provide students at all levels with challenge and enjoyment as well as building on literacy, communication and research skills.
- Handling and learning about archives provides pupils with an understanding of the importance of heritage



What can we offer to schools?

- Class/school trips to any of our four Archive Centres
- Visits from our staff to schools to give presentations/talks/activities
- Copies of documents for use in class either for factual research or as inspiration for creative projects
- Work Experience placements
