### **RECORDS' CONTEXT**

Name of creators: Angus Mackay, Norman Glass

Administrative history: The first football team to be formed in Caithness was Rovers of Wick in 1887. They were followed by St. Fergus and Victoria of Wick, Pulteney Thistle, Wick Academy and John o' Groat F.C. (both inaugurated in 1893). Only Thistle, Wick Academy and John o' Groat F.C. survived to compete in the newly formed Wick and Pulteney Senior Football League in 1894.

The Thurso League was formed in 1894, with Thistle, Rovers, Victoria, and St. Clair competing. The original four teams did not survive long term but Academicals, Pentland, Swifts and Dounreay Athletic replaced them in the league.

Caithness Amateur Football Association was founded in 1927 when 6 clubs from the Wick & Thurso Leagues played for a trophy donated by Captain A J Mackay. The first season was played as a knockout competition and was won by Thurso side Academicals or Acks as they are known locally, by beating fellow Thurso side Pentland 2-1. The other teams taking part were Swifts also from Thurso and the 3 Wick teams. Thistle, Academy and Groats. Thereafter the competition has usually been played on a League basis.

The village teams of the county were not invited to join the County League setup so formed their own competition in 1930 and this was called The Caithness North East Rural Football League. Games were played in the summer

months and the teams taking part were Mey, Castletown, Halkirk, Watten, Wick Boy Scouts and the first winners Keiss. The village teams eventually joined the County Association in 1975 and a first and second division league was formed. By now the league had switched from winter to summer having changed in 1960 due to harsh winters. This format has remained to the present day with 14 teams currently taking part.

Norman M. Glass (1894-1976) was a foreman and principal linotype operator in the John o' Groat Journal office. He wrote and compiled 'Caithness and the War: 1939-1945' and 'The History of Caithness Football: The First Eighty Years, 1888 to 1968'.

Angus Mackay was secretary of the Caithness Amateur Football Association and involved in the administration of football in the county for many years.
