Anne Fraser; all other material produced by the Following the Fish project (more info below) Administrative history: For over 100 years the Herring Girls were the backbone of the UK's fishing industry. Following the Fish was a joint project run by High Life Highland's

project run by High Life Highland's Archive Service in partnership with Suffolk Archives, the Norfolk Record Office, and Tasglann nan Eilean (the Hebridean Archives) to capture their stories.

The project team put out a call for records in 2024. This led to correspondence and interviews with Herring Girls and their families to capture memories, as well as digitise photographs and records detailing their work, travel, leisure time and wider experiences.

The project launched in-person exhibitions in Wick (Nucleus: The Nuclear and Caithness Archives) and Ipswich (Suffolk Archives) in May 2025, followed by an extensive touring

exhibition around the Highlands and Islands, and Suffolk and Norfolk. The exhibition is also available online.

The Caithness Archive continues to collect or digitise photographs and records relating to the Herring Girls. Please speak to a member of staff if you would like to deposit towards the collection
