Congratulations Kirsty Ewen!

BBC Sports Personality of The Year Unsung Hero 2018

Congratulations to Kirsty Ewen, employee and former HLH Sports Leader who was named as winner of the BBC Get Inspired Unsung Hero Award which was televised on BBC Sports Personality of the Year 2018.

Kirsty's journey from Sports Leader to HLH employee has not been an easy one. Kirsty first started volunteering at 15 years old when she took part in one of the first Sports Leader Awards delivered in Highland by Nairn Active Schools Co-ordinator Elizabeth McDonald.

Around the same time Kirsty began to struggle with her mental health and began self-harming which resulted in her giving up her love of competitive swimming and almost quitting her leadership involvement. Kirsty became involved in the Nairn Dreams & Teams Malawi Leadership Project which she believes, combined with Elizabeth's support "saved her life".

Kirsty is determined to inspire others through her volunteering opportunities and she certainly leads by example as this year she has scooped an incredible three awards including BBC Scotland's Sports Unsung Hero, SportScotland Volunteer of the Year and Volunteer of the Year at Highland Coaching & Volunteering Awards.

Kirsty's achievements as a Young Leader were also recognised at the event by the HLH Leadership Programme when she was awarded the newly launched Gold Hoodie, the top award in the programme.

Kirsty's journey from volunteer Sports Leader to employee with HLH began as a Sports Coach within the Active Schools team before and after University.

At 28 years old, she is now employed in the Active Schools Team as School Sports Competition Organiser and Disability Sport Officer.



Leadership Conference 2018

Over a weekend in November, 43 Young Leaders from across Highland took part in our first residential 'Choose To Lead' Conference in Nairn. Selected for their commitment to the High Life Highland Leadership Programme, the Young Leaders took part in a range of leadership activities and skills which they will be able to use in their own schools and communities.

A highlight of the weekend was the High Life Highland Annual Coaching and Volunteering Awards. Young Leaders opened the event and read the nominations for the awards. The evening featured the launch of the new Gold Hoodie award, #itsallaboutthehoodie, which went to 11 Young Leaders who had completed more than 500 hours of leadership.

During the leadership training and life skills, everyone had the opportunity to take part in many sessions such as the defibrillator and CPR training (led by Nairn Leisure staff), dodgeball leader, an introduction to the disability sports of boccia and table cricket, learning through fun to be a High Voltage Library Leader with the introduction of Technobot

equipment and new ideas for fun warm-ups at Judo Rocks sessions.

Service Update

High Life Highland - Music Tuition

Since the transfer of Music Tuition from The Highland Council to HLH four new instructors have been employed providing voice, guitar, drum kit and pipe band drumming in Badenoch & Strathspey, Nairn, Inverness, Easter Ross and Skye & Lochalsh.

As well as increasing capacity for pupils, the Music Tuition Service is also branching out into new territory and are delighted to announce the launch of after school and evening classes offering music lessons to members of the public at Culloden Library from next year.

Sessional music instructors in keyboard, guitar and drum kit have been recruited and will deliver a block of classes in January. Classes can be booked from 2019 and will consist of blocks of 8 classes with the option of either 1:1 or 1:2 tuition that allows friends or family to reduce the cost per person.

Year of Young People 2018 Draws to a Close

In recognition of the drawing to a close of the Year of Young People (YoYP) we have a focus on the voice, influence and equality strands of our youth work. Participation and equality & discrimination were the two themes that children and young people said they wanted to feature during 2018.

The year itself has been about publicly recognising, valuing and celebrating what it is to be young.

In January a launch event for YoYP in Highland was held at the Spectrum Centre in Inverness which was led jointly by our previous Youth Convener and Maree Todd, Minister for Childcare and Early Years.

The main aspiration for YoYP in Highland has been that children and young people have stronger and more influential voices on issues affecting their lives, exemplified by the following:

Supported by HLH's marketing team and youth services, a group of young people have developed and had full control of three social media platforms designed to bring together young people from across Highland to share stories and ideas and hopes.....

It has also provided opportunities for senior officials and politicians to engage with young Highlanders. In November, Maree Todd tweeted and included a short video in which she said how great it was that young people had engaged and connected very positively with her and other decision makers across Highland and further afield.

Current Youth Convener, Esme Leitch and members of the Lochaber Youth Voice gave a presentation to the Council's Lochaber Area Committee in November, updating councillors on the variety of activities undertaken within the area during the Year of Young People.

Lochaber highlights included young people from Ardnamurchan attending PRIDE in Glasgow; 2 young people in Kinlochleven receiving Young Scot Volunteer of the Year Award; and Highland Youth Arts Hub Live projection at Glenfinnan Monument, which featured young people from Fort William.

Members also agreed that the Council will facilitate a consultation with Sheil Buses, community transport providers, stakeholders and young people from the Lochaber area High Schools, West Highland College UHI and youth groups to ascertain how public transport could be improved to ensure it meets the needs of young people accessing education, training, leisure and work in the area.

Members also pledged to foster better and more ways of engaging with young people in the area.

Bullying Prevention

New Bullying Prevention Policy

In June 2018 Highland Council launched its new policy and guidance on positive relationships and bullying prevention. The document has been influenced and informed by the Misty Isle youth forum from Skye, who consulted widely with their peers across Highland.

On reading through the guidance it's easy to see how the voices of young people have been listened to – from the straightforward yet meaningful language to the many examples of quotes from youngsters such as:

“The young person behaving negatively should always be treated with kindness and the adults should try to understand why they have acted this way rather than punish them”

The purpose of the policy and guidance is to ensure consistent approaches across Highland and young people have definitely been major contributors to ultimately achieving this.

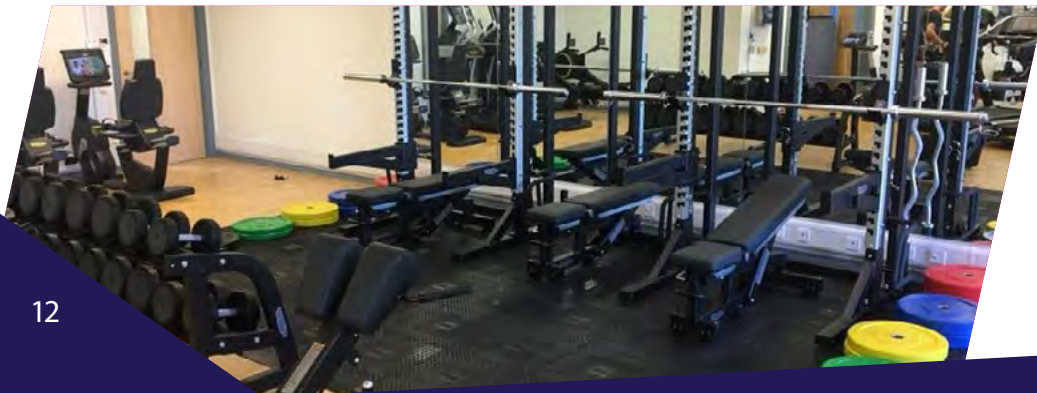

Technology Boosts Fifteenth Pavilion Art Fair

The fifteenth Art Fair held at Strathpeffer Pavilion in November welcomed more than 1,100 visitors over the three-day event, exceeding all targets and expectations from previous years. All of the artwork on offer was also available to buy online for the first time ever.

The Strathpeffer Pavilion Art Fair is an event originally started by the Friends of Strathpeffer Pavilion – a group of volunteers from the local community set up to assist with fundraising to support the village venue. After a number of years in existence, and having raised many thousands of pounds, the group formally disbanded in 2016 with some of the former members continuing to work individually with HLH around the Art Fair.

This year's event was a great success, with a large increase on visitors on last year. Importantly for the wide range of artists taking part, sales of their work went up by almost 30% on 2017

spectators had a great time pelting the hardy swimmers with snowballs!

The community council say: “Tom doesn’t just do a great job of encouraging and inspiring the people with whom he comes into contact through his work and his volunteering, his infectious enthusiasm and energy is a positive influence on the wider community. We want him to know much we all appreciate him.”

Community Allotment - Milnafua

Cross Service Working

Introducing Learners to HLH Services

The HLH Adult Learning team is keen to raise the profile of literacies learning and make it easier for adult learners to take advantage of all HLH services.

The team has been using a range of activities throughout 2018 to introduce learners to services in or close to the learner's own environment. Through activities such as visits to the high street, leisure facilities, libraries and museums, learners have been encouraged to make use of public facilities and attractions on their own.



During Adult Learners' Week, a short course at Inverness Museum and Art Gallery was offered to learners, led by an adult literacies tutor and supported by the community engagement officer at Inverness Museum and Art Gallery, Alison Partfitt. Learners had the opportunity to handle objects and photographs, explore what culture and heritage means to them personally, and create written responses as a group and individually. Alison led a short session exploring museum curation and learners contributed to making a display of work in the Community Gallery. A similar session was also offered in HMP Inverness for prisoners.

Developing Digital Literacy

To be able to participate fully in 21st century Scottish society, people need to be able to access and use technology and the internet. To assist people who have a lack of skills and confidence in using digital technology, Adult Learning Coordinator Nina Mackay and Leisure Supervisor Craig Edwards from the East Caithness Community Facility helped raise awareness with High Life Highland colleagues about the challenges people may face when using digital devices to access our services.

With the support of the Mhor Collective, One Digital - Digital Champions Training was offered to volunteers who support adult learners and customer service assistants who work within East Caithness Community Facility. The training highlighted areas of digital use and literacy that might be challenging for people who have digital or literacy issues.

Best Year Yet - Highland Folk Museum

Visitor Numbers Increase Again!

Staff at the popular Highland Folk Museum are delighted to report that the visitor attraction has had its best season yet! With a record breaking 76,854 visitors in their seven month season, up 10% from 2017, together with donations and guide book sales of over £209,000, it has been the most successful year to date for the museum.



Over the season there were 44 days of special events, an increase of more than a dozen on the year before. The extended events programme and increased footfall were contributing factors for a significant rise in income in both the museum café and shops. As High Life Highland is a charity, this welcome increase will be put to good use in supporting delivery of museum services across the organisation. Preparations have already started for the 2019 season and we are looking forward to seeing you all at the Highland Folk Museum next year!

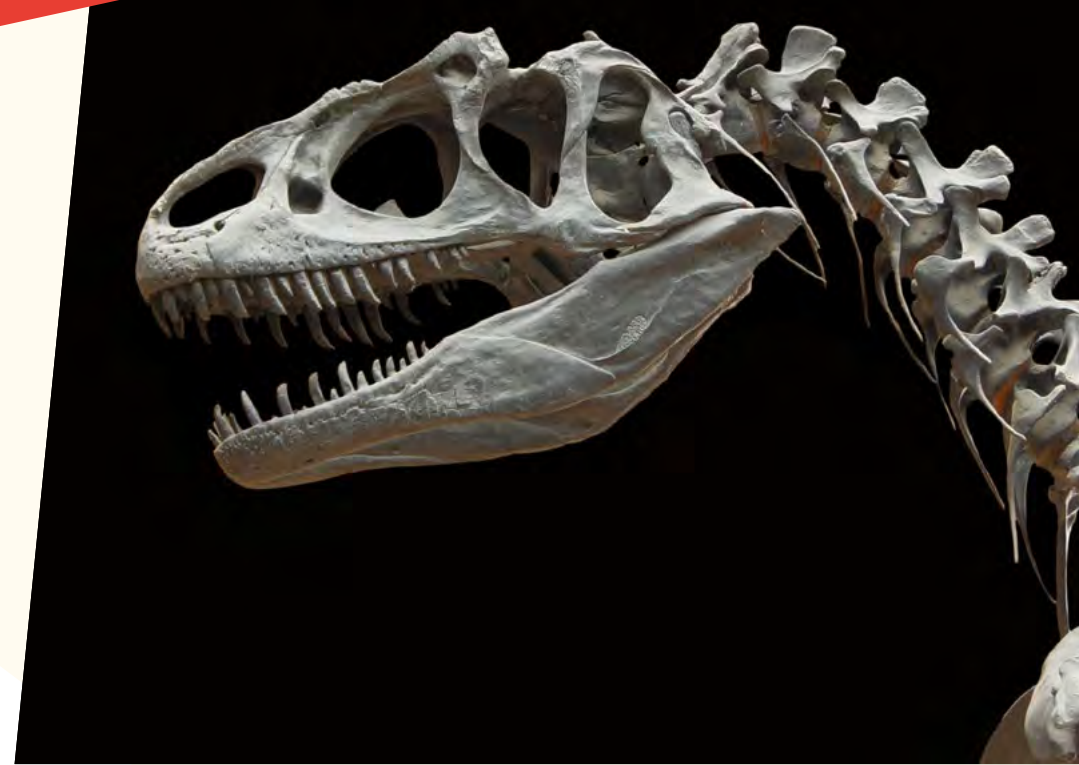
In the Footprints of Dinosaurs

The Dinosaurs are Here

Did you know that dinosaurs used to roam Scotland? Recent discoveries of 150-million year-old fossil footprints near Inverness have shown that dinosaurs literally lived in our back gardens! Follow the footprints through the museum from those earliest fossils, which gave rise to dinosaurs as we know them, to the most recent and exciting dinosaur discoveries from the UK.

The dinosaur exhibition opened at Inverness Museum & Art Gallery on Saturday 24 November and the exhibition is open until Saturday 2 February. At the opening weekend, visitors were treated to a spectacular display of life-size replica casts, fossilised bones, teeth, talons and animations, including one of a plesiosaur as the Loch Ness Monster. 100 people visited the exhibition in the first hour of opening and over 600 visitors came to the museum on the first day!

The exhibition includes objects loaned from Staffin Dinosaur Museum, Skye; Perth Museum & Art Gallery and Bespoke Scientific. Animations were created by Brendan Body at Dundee University.



The project has attracted funding of £15,500 from Inverness Common Good Fund.

There are plenty of activities for young people and adults to get involved such as the recent talk by Dr Neil Clark, Curator of Palaeontology at the Hunterian Museum on Dinosaurs from Scotland's Jurassic Isle and a day where young people made their own dino bath bombs at the museum! Around The Archives

Celebrating the Archive Service

It's been a busy few months across Highland Archive Service. We have welcomed visitors from across the world, helping them to trace their family history or to use our collections to further their knowledge about a multitude of other subjects. We have also run an extensive and diverse programme of exhibitions, classes and events over the past few months, working with a variety of groups, schools and individuals to spread the word about the amazing collections we care for.

On 13th October, over 130 people attended "The History of Highland Healthcare", an event hosted by the Highland Archive Centre to mark the 70th anniversary of the NHS. A packed audience listened with interest to speakers David Alston, Jim Leslie and Steve Leslie (seen with Highland Archives' Community Engagement Officer, Lorna Steele)

before looking at a diverse display of documents relating to nursing, hospitals and other aspects of healthcare in the Highlands. We are grateful to NHS Highland for their support of this event.

As part of the First World War centenary events Highland Archive Centre worked with pupils at Inverness High School and Bishop Eden's Primary to produce pieces of creative work inspired by two of the men who appear on St Andrew's Cathedral's Roll of Honour, which were then displayed at Inverness Cathedral.....

Around The Archives

On the same theme, Skye and Lochalsh Archive Centre was invited (by the local Community Association) to take the WW1 exhibition – An Cogadh Mòr over to Raasay for an event which featured archive displays from our collections, including school log books, maps, photographs and newspaper articles as well as a poppy-making workshop and the World War I song performed by Raasay School pupils.

Staff at Nucleus worked in partnership with Generations Working Together, Wick Voices, and pupils and teachers from Wick High School on the first in a series of activities planned to bring generations together to talk about life, work and fun, using archive documents as inspiration for conversations. Wick Voices recorded a number of conversations which will be hosted on their website. This was followed by a series of 5 classes for the Caithness “Let’s Get On With It Together” group (LGOWIT). The first class was an introductory “Archive 101” with subsequent classes focusing on family history, social history and some of the collections we hold. The classes have been such a success

that we are already drawing up plans for another set, open to the public, in the spring.

Meanwhile at Skye and Lochalsh Archive Centre; we ran a series of local history classes in collaboration with High Life Highland’s Adult Learning Service. The classes encouraged participants to follow their own research by delving into the archives, with staff support on hand to provide digital skills training with iPads and laptops, demonstrating the wide range of online resources which are also available. The classes were oversubscribed and we hope to offer them again in the New Year.

Lochaber Archive Centre Reopens

New Home For Lochaber Archives

The Archives service is delighted to announce that the move to new premises in Alexander Ross House is now complete and Lochaber Archive Centre is once again open to the public. The official reopening of Lochaber Archive Centre took place on the 19th September, on the same day as the opening of neighbouring building, Charles Kennedy House. It was a great pleasure to welcome around 60 people that day to view a display of documents from our collections and see into our new strongroom.

This was followed, on 19th November, by “Lochaber during World War One”, an event held to mark the centenary of the Armistice. Visitors spent time looking at a display which told the story of both the Lochaber Home Front (using police occurrence books, Town Council minutes and school log books) and the stories of some of those who left Lochaber to fight in the conflict.

We are also delighted to welcome our new member of staff, Eilidh MacColl, who will be based at Lochaber and look forward to sharing our collections with her and learning from her extensive local knowledge! Gifting Bookbug in Neo-natal Intensive Care Unit (NICU)

For some families the NICU is their baby's first home. High Life Highland Libraries staff want to ensure that this experience is as rich and rewarding in terms of shared reading, early bonding and attachment and the other known benefits of the Bookbug Programme as possible.

To support this we recently spent time with the NICU team in Raigmore delivering Bookbug training to a range of Neo-natal staff including nurses, physiotherapists and consultants.

Families in the NICU in Raigmore should now be able to access their Bookbug Baby Bags during their stay and should receive support from staff to make the most of the brilliant resources.

The Bookbug programme encourages parents to sing and read with babies at an earlier age than they may actually have considered. It also encourages positive parent-child interaction, participation in fun activities and increases



awareness of the many developmental benefits of introducing wee ones to music, songs and rhymes from birth.

Bookbug Bags are free and full of brilliant books and goodies for you to share with your child. Bags are given to every child in Scotland, from birth to Primary 1. Your child will receive four bags in total: Baby Bag, Toddler Bag, Explorer Bag and the P1 Family Bag. There are also Gaelic versions of each bag available.
